Volunteer Opportunity – Curlew Custodian

Phillip Island Nature Parks is leading a threatened species program which aims to establish a selfsustaining wild population of Bush stone-curlews on Phillip Island (Millowl). There are two aviaries housing curlews at the Koala Conservation Reserve, and a dedicated team of *Curlew Custodian* Volunteers help to care for the curlews by assisting with their feeding and monitoring.

We are currently looking to expand this team, and have an **induction session planned for Thursday 29 February, from 2:00-4:00pm in the Chisholm Room at the Koala Conservation Reserve**. If you don't mind handling insects and raw meat, and love working with wildlife, this role might be for you! There are limited spots available for this session, so if you'd like to come along, please sign up to the Curlew Custodians – Induction activity on My Impact.

Beach Nesting Birds Internship Students

This summer, the Nature Parks has had two internship students from Deakin University assisting with the annual Beach Nesting Birds monitoring program. Internship Supervisor, Ranger Jon Fallaw tells us about the work they've been doing and how it contributes to conservation work.

"About half of all hooded plover nests fail with no identified cause. The focus of Lily and Luke's internship is to use remote cameras to identify the unexplained reasons for nest failures. Lily started in November and has been involved in the hooded plover and gull survey, and snipe survey and both Lily and Luke have been monitoring fairy terns at Observation Point and crested terns at the Nobbies. Luke started in January and hit the ground running as the hooded plover season was in full swing, monitoring new nests and chicks. Luke will finish the cataloguing of images and finalise findings for the season overall. Their contribution provides Nature Parks with important insights and research data into nesting shorebirds on Phillip Island (Millowl)".

In reviewing current programs, we've recently made the decision to no longer facilitate the Turn the Tide Volunteer program and we would like to acknowledge the contributions made by the Turn the Tide Volunteers.

Developed in 2018, in partnership with Zoos Victoria for the 'When Balloons Fly, Sea Birds Die' campaign, the continuous efforts of 54 passionate and dedicated Volunteers have contributed to the Australian Marine Debris Initiative (AMDI) database and the Phillip Island Nature Parks 'Bins on Boats' research and action.

This program has removed thousands of kilograms of waste from Phillip Island's beaches, and this alone demonstrates the incredible success of this team in protecting nature for wildlife. We hope this great work can continue with Clean Up Australia as they also have a wonderful Volunteer program.
